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
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Republican Replacement Healthcare Plan Ends Up Dead on Arrival

When this article was started, I planned on laying out a list of possible scenarios in which we could see a replacement or modification to the Affordable Care Act. However, this plan was quickly thwarted, because as of Friday afternoon, the American Health Care Act (AHCA), sometimes called Trumpcare, Republicare, or even

Care Act (AHCA), sometimes called Trumpcare, Republicare, or even Ryancare, is no more. On Thursday, March 23rd, Donald Trump offered house Republicans an ultimatum which stated that either the AHCA be passed, or the legislation would be shelved for the foreseeable future. The next day, the latter option happened; despite the GOP having a majority in the House and Senate. Speaker Paul Ryan rushed to the White House to tell Trump that there weren't enough votes to push the

legislation through. As a result, Ryan later announced that the bill would be pulled from the House, and that there were no plans to try again. So, where did it all go wrong?

To many, the failure to repeal the Affordable Care Act (ACA) is a sign of deep divisions within the GOP's various factions. While more moderate center-right groups, such as the Tuesday Group, supported the bill, far-right factions within the party including the Freedom Caucus rebelled against Trump's healthcare plan, stating that they wanted the ACA repealed and scaled back even further. Additionally, many Republican representatives who represented districts where Hillary Clinton won or was extremely close to winning in the 2016 elections were hesistant to support the bill. All of these factors together resulted in the ACHA being largely doomed from the start.

22 votes from their own party and still pull it through. However, by Friday, the number of possible "no" votes totaled to over 50 representatives.

It's hard to understate just how un-



popular this bill was on both sides of the aisle. The bill was first criticized by the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office. The CBO stated that while the ACHA would reduce the deficit by \$151 billion (less than half of what was it was projected to save), over 24 million Americans could be uninsured compared to the current system. Even after being revised, the legislation featured large cuts to essential services such as prenatal care, mental health services, and even Medicaid, an extremely vital service to many of Trump's supporters.

For both Democrats and Republicans, there was a lot to hate about this legislation, and it showed. According to FiveThirtyEight's estimates, the polling average for the bill was 30% favorable and 47% unfavorable. To add to the bad news for Republicans, favorability on Obamacare actually increased after Donald Trump's election. 2017

was the first year since the ACA was enacted that more Americans supported the program than opposed it, and that margin is growing. One can only speculate as to why this is, but perhaps the threat of losing the benefits for many Americans, including an extremely

large percentage of Trump's voter base, swayed opinion on the matter.

And so, the American Health Care Act has quite ironically died on the floor of the house (yes I stole that joke from Conan O'Brien, sue me). So where does that leave Donald Trump? All we know for certain at the moment is that Obamacare is here to stay. In what form, however, is a different question entirely. While

Trump might be incapable of amending or cutting away from the legislation itself, keep in mind that the Department of Health and Human Services has the ability to make their own judgements on the implementation of the programs in question, Moreover, Tom Price, Trump's Health and Human Services Secretary is a fervent opponent of the ACA. Price could make significant changes as to what services are considered "required services". More specifically, the secretary can make changes as to what is included in these necessary services. For example, the bill requires insurers to include coverage for mental health care, but whether or not this includes services such as behavioral therapy or occupational therapy for children can be changed by the Secretary. Some of these changes have already been put in place, such as the pulling of enrollment advertisements from the media.

which experts speculate has caused a drop in enrollment by young adults. Despite this, it is estimated that 11 million more people will join Obamacare in 2017, and it is very unlikely that Trump and Price will stand idle and keep the ACA's programs as they are.

In addition to this, there is a more important lesson to be learned, one that Trump must embrace very quickly if he hopes to push any legislation through Congress: the deep ideological rifts within the Republican party that were made clear through this bill's failure will not go away anytime soon. The fragmented nature of the party, which Trump is expected to lead, should serve as a harsh wakeup call to the president that the West Wing is a different world than that of a business. While Trump might like to believe that his word is final, reality couldn't be further from this. In the case of this bill, large amounts of opposition came from factions like the Freedom Caucus, with 22 out of the 50 possible "no's" coming from the group. In addition, the health care vote uncovered large rifts between Senate and House Republicans. The AHCA was drafted by House Speaker Paul Ryan, without any input from prominent Republican senators such as Tom Cotton and Rand Paul. Trump's first large legislative failure should make it increasingly clear that in order to pass legislation moving forward, such as the budget or raising the debt ceiling, the president must be capable of working with these various groups within his party. Until very recently these groups had been united in opposition to President Obama's policies, but now to many are perceived as directionless and at war with themselves.

Donald Trump: the First American President Elected by Russians

In the days following James Comey's testimony before Congress, there has been increasing evidence of communication between the Trump campaign and the Russian government. While the link has been far from conclusively proven, evidence has been piling up of meetings between Trump staffers and Russian officials which generate suspicion.

This is far from a new story. The main allegation that has been made is that Trump's campaign conspired with Russians to facilitate the leak of Democratic National Committee (DNC), which were released (via WikiLeaks) last July. In December, outgoing President Barack Obama imposed sanctions against Russia for their suspected interference in the election.

Notably, two Trump officials have left prominent positions because of improper ties to Russia-Paul Manafort and Michael Flynn. One more-former Senator and current Attorney General Jeff Sessions—is still the subject of inquiry. Manafort resigned in August because financial records indicate he had received money to promote Russian interests while working in Ukraine.

More recently, in January, the Wall Street Journal uncovered records of contact between Michael Flynn and Russia. Flynn had been Trump's pick for National Security Advisor. Shortly after being confirmed, it was revealed that Flynn had spoken with Russian officials about the sanctions imposed by Obama. More specifically, it is believed that Flynn was reassuring Russians that the sanctions would be lifted. Again, this is not conclusive, but it certainly could indicate a guid-pro-guo relationship. In other words, Flynn's phone calls support the narrative that Russia hacked the DNC in order to install Trump as President and

Another storm of controversy arose over meetings between Jeff Sessions and the Russian ambassador. Sessions had previously testified in his confirmation hearings that he "did not have com-

That alone is concerning enough. Indeed, the sheer fact of Russian interference in the Presidential election is itself highly troubling. But it remains to be seen how far these ties go. Flynn, Sessions, Manafort-these are only the officials where there is evidence of colluding with Russia. Add in the fact that Trump openly called for Russian to continue hacking the Hillary campaign (in what he later would claim was only a semi-serious statement), and you have a troubling picture of Russian sympathy on the Trump

Again, there has not been conclusive evidence that the Trump campaign coordinated any of these activities. The problem is that the cloud of illegitimacy still hangs over the Trump presidency. Until the Trump campaign can prove that it did not work with Russians to sabotage Hillary Clinton, Donald Trump's presidency will rest on uncertain grounds. An election unfairly won is no legitimate basis for power-it's the sure sign of a failure of democracy.

On the other hand, should it prove that the Trump campaign did in fact conspire to delegitimize the Clinton campaign, the implications are even more troubling. Were it true, we must confront the reality that our democracy no longer functions independently. If Trump were indeed installed by Russia, not only would it threaten the integrity of our system, it would pose a substantial security risk to United States/Russia bilateral relations.

The facts are not quite settled. But this ongoing story is of vital importance to the continuation of our democracy-if it has

Sessions maintained that he was doing so in his capacity as a Senator, not as a Trump surrogate, but the timing is suspect. One of Sessions meetings with the ambassador was during the Republican National Convention—in other words, right as the Republican Party formally rallied around Trump. Sessions eventually recused himself from the ongoing investigation of the rest of the Trump administration.

Food Company Does More Harm Than Good For Bee Population

In early March everyone's favorite whole grain cereal, Cheerios, launched a new campaign called #BringBack-theBees, responding to the sudden and extreme decline in bee populations. Just last October, seven species of the Hawaiian yellow-faced bee were added to the endangered species list, and the bumblebee joined the list for the first time in January.

First, Cheerios said goodbye to the adored Buzz the Bee to raise awareness since "44% of bee colonies in the U.S. collapsed in 2016." Cheerios also reminded consumers that the bees play an essential role in the world's food systems, as "1 in 3 bites of food we eat is made possible by bees and other pollinators" and "more than two thirds of the world's crop species rely on pollinators."

The campaign centered on a 100 Million Seed Giveaway, which urged the public to sign up to receive packets of wildflowers to provide bees with nectar. While the goal was 100 million seeds, Cheerios ended up giving away 1.5 billion seeds, completely depleting

their seed supply and subsequently halting their give-away campaign.

However, recent controversy has arisen around the types of seeds in Cheerios' packets and their potential invasiveness. Invasive species can overshadow the native species because there are no natural controls on

their population. Invasive species also grow unchecked and thus take up excessive space, deplete important resources, and spread disease.

Cheerios claims that the wildflower packets "contain the same varieties of seeds that consumers will find in seed

racks at major national home store chains throughout the U.S." However, the company reported that forget-menots and California poppy are included in the wildflower seed mix. Forget-menots are a banned, noxious weed in Massachusetts and Connecticut while California poppy is considered an invasive species in the southeast.

Clearly, some seeds are only native

to certain parts of the country. Cheerios posted on Facebook, "The seed varieties in the mix are not considered invasive" and "flower varieties within the Bee Friendlier Mix were selected for their flowers which produce nectar and pollen that are attractive to bees and other pollinators." Perhaps Cheerios

is sending state tailored seed mixes, but they have not confirmed this.

The company also plans to build new bee habitats on their oat farms by hosting "about 3,300 acres of nectarand pollen-rich wildflowers, which are full of the nutrients bees and other

pollinators need to stay strong." While this part of the campaign seems progressive and beneficial, others question it.


Here's why: Cheerios is likely guilty of contributing to some of the issues plaguing bee populations because Cheerios' oat farms are monocultures.

Monocultures, or land farmed for hundreds of miles with a single crop,

cause a decline in bee habitats for various reasons. One: monocultures are a single crop so, the entire field blooms at the same time, providing food for a short time (unlike mixed wildflowers). Two: having only one type of pollen as a food source can lead to nutrient deficiencies and poor immune systems. Three: monocultures require intense pesticide use, since a single insect infestation could wipe out the entire crop. These pesticides can be toxic to the bees themselves and to the wildflowers they snack on.

Therefore, it's ironic that a company like Cheerios has a #BringBacktheBees campaign when they likely implement practices that contribute to the endangerment of bees in the first place. Even putting this aside, Cheerios did not take the necessary precautions to prevent the spread of invasive species.

While the campaign was in good heart, it might be safer to plant wild-flowers bought at your local store. This way you are guaranteed to be planting native wildflowers that bloom at all different times throughout the summer—and layoff the pesticides!

US Led Coaltion Surrounds ISIS at Mosul

Since their rapid victory against Iraqi forces in 2014, the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria (ISIS) has become the main threat to democracy in the Middle East. Soon that may no longer be the case. The United States led coalition to oust ISIS from Iraq has contained the extremist movement to a final city in the country, Mosul. The city has been systematically besieged beginning in October of last year and so far more than half of it has been liber-

ated in bloody street to street fighting. Victory by the Iraqi forces here stands in sharp contrast to the initial defeat they faced from the rapidly expanding ISIS forces who captured the city in June 2014.

ISIS has been put on the defensive in the near three-year effort by the United States to defeat the terrorist group. Under President Obama, the United States returned to Iraq in 2014 after leaving triumphantly nearly four years previously. America's commitment to the conflict is purported to be

supportive rather than direct, mostly focused on air power and logistics, but so far 25 American soldiers have died in the revived conflict. The mainstay of the fighting has been done by the Iraqi military, Shia militias and Kurdish forces, trained and supported by the US led coalition. These efforts have been aided by the involvement of 59 nations in collaboration ranging from Morocco to New Zeeland providing support ranging from the training of the national police by the Spanish and air power offered by the Dutch.

Their rapid seizure of the oil-rich territory and expansion into neighboring Syrian Civil War lead to ISIS becoming the main opposition to the Governments of Iraq and Syria. In response. the Obama administration formed a

coalition of allies to help Iragi's liberate their country. Last fall, Fallujah, Irag's second city, was liberated, leaving ISIS solely in control of Mosul. Starting last December and into the Trump administration, Iraqi and coalition forces have been working to liberate Mosul.

ISIS rose to power in Iraq by becoming the main opposition to the new, US-backed regime. After Saddam Hussein was deposed, American administrators disbanded his large swaths of the Sunni population in Iraq. This gave us the name the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria, or ISIS.

Finally it looks like ISIS will be pushed out of Iraq. Over the last few years the United States has formed a coalition of dozens of countries to help the Iraqi army recapture lost territory. After several initial setbacks ISIS has been pushed to its final stronghold in Mosul.

After Mosul is liberated, Iraq will be at a crossroads. The leader of Iraqi Kurdistan has called for an independence referen-

After its fall, the civil war in the country has switched from being between ISIS, Assad, and several moderate factions to a showdown between ISIS and Assad.

The future of the Middle East is complicated, but the ending of this chapter of violence in Iraq will give the country an opportunity to rebuild after fourteen years of conflict.

Friendly Reminder that Science is **Cool AF**

Because science is dope as hell, scientist have found a way to use spinach to build a mini version of a working heart by using spinach leaves like scaffolding. This new technique may be able to one day aid in tissue regeneration and help solve the long-standing issue of repairing damaged organs. Scientists have already been able to create large-scale human tissue in labs by using methods like 3D printing, but always struggled to recreate the smaller, more delicate blood vessels that are crucial to tissue health.

The study, which was published earlier this month, offers a new way to grow a vascular system. The inability to recreate a vascular network has been a major road block for tissue engineering. These scientist hope to use spinach leaves for their branching network of thin veins that deliver water and nutrients to their cells by decellularizing the plant and using its remaining cellulose. Cellulose is biocompatible and has already been used in a wide variety of regenerative medicine applications.

The eventual goal of the study is to be able to replace damaged tissue in patients who have had heart attacks or who have suffered other cardiac issues that prevent their hearts from contracting. The veins in the modified leaves should be able to deliver oxygen to the entire swath of replacement tissue, which is vital in generating new heart matter. The study team hopes to one day be able to use other types of plants to repair a variety of tissues in the human body, like swapping out the cells in wood to help fix human bones.



A Look at Human Accountability and Rape Culture

We live in a rape culture that has near impossible standards to meet, in order for the public and the court to actually address the crime both for the victim and the rapist. People want to believe rapists are monstrous beings that can be identified and avoided on sight. So when the rapist almost inevitably turns out to be an everyday person, the public is likely to disbelieve the victim. This is a fundamental problem with othering evil actions; it takes responsibility away. Humanity can be pretty shitty, and sadly many people would rather let a rapist go free than hold them responsible and accept that the person they bonded with at a barbeque is capable of evil.

Whenever a rape goes public, the comments around it are filled with people who intend to be kind and supportive by saying things like, "That's not a human, that's a monster" or "Luckily my son would never do this." These comments- while nowhere as cruel as those that blame the victimare still harmful. Why? Because they remove rapists', and the people surrounding the rapist's, responsibility as human beings and replace it with a monster/other identity. The moment something normalizing about a rapist (such as their swim times or scholarships, maybe their favorite food or mother's name), is printed by newspapers, the rapist suddenly becomes someone the public and courts can relate to. Truth is: most people honestly do hate rapists, including rapists who don't identify with the monstrous image culture perpetuates. They hate this image of some ghastly, vaguefaced man hurting someone close to them in a violent attack before dissipating back into the bushes. They

However, they don't hate their friend, their brother, their aunt, their kid, their boyfriend, or themselves. But the fact of the matter is rapists are these people. They are not just faceless monsters; they exist outside of their crime. I myself have had moments where I learned people I knew and trusted, some for years, were not bothered by actions of rape

or sexual assault (so long as it's not called rape or assault). These were eye-opening moments for me: the realization that friends I had gone on road trips with, friends who claimed to be feminist and hate rape (at least in the abstract), were actually not upset with rape in reality, because to be upset with it meant acknowledging those they knew, or possibly (though I hope not) themselves, were rapists.

If we only allow oursleves to see rapists as monsters, it is too easy to avoid convicting them when the papers start telling us about how human they are. It becomes very hard to acknowledge their capability of committing such a heinous crime when it turns out they are humans, too easy to avoid intervening when they are our friends, and too easy to avoid correcting behavior leading to a mindset that rape it okay. While those subtle but telling signs - creepy comments and pushy behaviors - might be rude, you would never believe your little sibling could ever actually rape someone. However we need to acknowledge that rape is human action, a very dark, evil human action. Once we acknowledge that humans, and not monsters, commit these crimes we can successfully hold the people who commit the crimes accountable. We can become more willing to stop those who engage in these crimes, even if they are our friends and family, or even self. Hopefully by acknowledging the reality of a rapist's personhood, we will better be able to give justice and belief to those harmed by rape.



placing the console in my backpack, I hopped on a Metro North train to Fordham and continued my journey in the land of Hyrule during the ride. The Nintendo Switch feels great to play on the go, and has added plenty of fun to my daily train rides. Whether I play my Nintendo Switch on my TV at home or in the McGinley Center, it is always a fun experience.

Most of my time with the Nintendo Switch has been spent playing The Legend of Zelda: Breath of the Wild. (No spoilers in this article, promise!) To put it simply,

think *Breath of the Wild* is the best Legend of Zelda game Nintendo has ever created. It breaks the conventions of the Zelda series in the best ways possible, offering newfound freedom in any way you can imagine, except for petting dogs. You can't do that, but you can play with them. In past three-dimensional Zelda games, the game world was made up of separated areas with defined borders, limiting the player's freedom in exploring Hyrule. *Breath of the Wild* breaks this convention by following one rule: if you can see it, you

can get to it. In one instance, I noticed the orange glow of a Shrine at the top of a snowy mountain on the horizon, and spent two in-game days traveling to it, facing strong monsters and freezing weather on my journey. *Breath of the Wild*'s best experiences are the ones the player creates, like my adventure to reach the Shrine atop the mountain.

The game's open world offers countless hours exploration, as the map is bigthan The Legend Zelda: Ocarina Time, Wind The Waker, and Twilight Princess combined.

Breath of the Wild gives the player freedom in much more than just exploration. The game redefines puzzlesolving in the Zelda series, allowing the player to find several solutions to one puzzle. A puzzle I had trouble with required the player to burn a trail of leaves leading to a wooden barricade blocking a door, with hanging metal lanterns located above the leaves. The first solution I found was to use Magnesis, an ability which allows Link to move metal objects from a distance, to smash a lantern against a wall, causing

its flame to fall on the leaves. Another solution was to shoot a bomb arrow at the leaves, igniting them without breaking a lantern. Also, I could have placed Red Chuchu Jelly near the leaves and struck it with an arrow, blowing it up and burning the leaves. Most puzzles in *Breath of the Wild* offer the player this much freedom in solving them, making the puzzle-solving fresh and exciting.

Freedom is prevalent in all aspects of Breath of the Wild, and its story is no exception. The player is free to choose the order in which the story is experienced, if the player chooses to even experience it at all. After completing the tutorial on the Great Plateau, the player can travel anywhere in Hyrule and immediately face the final boss without completing any other objectives. In my playthrough, I decided to complete all objectives related to the main story before facing the final boss. I think that this is the best way to experience the game, as the game's backstory came together in pieces as I completed all the main story objectives. The story is aided by cutscenes with full voice acting, and can get very emotional at times.

Playing The Legend of Zelda: Breath of the Wild on the Nintendo Switch has been lots of fun over the past few weeks. I think the Nintendo Switch is off to a great start, with plenty of great games like Splatoon 2 and Super Mario Odyssey coming this year. Overall, the Nintendo Switch has a very promising future.

The Value of New Intellectual Properties in Video Games

Industry needs fresh IP's, not stale sequels

Horizon Zero Dawn (HZD) was one of the more anticipated releases of early 2017, contending with games like Nioh and The Legend of Zelda: Breath of the Wild and new console, the Nintendo Switch. What set HZD apart in the minds of most video game consumers was the impressive originality of the game concept. For those unfamiliar, HZD is set in a sort of post-apocalyptic world overrun with robotic beasts and dinosaur-like creatures. The story focuses on a young hunter named Aloy,

who has been cast out from her tribe, and her quest to traverse the expanse and learn more about her own history and the world in which she lives. This game felt truly new. This was a character we had never met before in a world we had never yet seen. The entire concept, while riffing significantly off open-world action RPG tropes, was intoxicatingly imaginative. Even more impressive was the fact that publisher Guerilla Games was able to create on such a scale after working with the Killzone IP uninterrupted since 2004.

So what does this mean and why is HZD important? Let's take a look at the best-selling games of 2016. In order from first to last: Call of Duty: Infinite Warfare, Battlefield 1, The Division, NBA 2K17, Madden NFL 17, Grand Theft Auto V, Overwatch, Call of Duty: Black Ops III, FIFA 17, and Final Fantasy XV. All but one of these games are a sequel or a spin-off of an existing IP. One is even a remaster of a previously released game. Still, these are the bestsellers, the games we gamers went out to purchase by our own volition. Intuitively, this shows that the video game public is simply not predominantly interested in new video game experiences. Of course, publishers will be taking note of these numbers; it's why they

make these games after all. If existing IPs like Call of Duty, Grand Theft Auto, and Battlefield are the moneymakers, why try anything new? COD: Infinite Warfare was the thirteenth installment in the COD franchise. Activision had published a variation of a first-person military shooter twelve times prior and the thirteenth time was able to sit at the top of the charts, undisputed. There is no incentive to divert from the

obscene flows of cash.

quels and spinoffs make their money hand-over-fist, now more than ever before there is little reason for gamers to side with one console over another. If I can play what were effectively the top ten games of 2016 on either the PS4 or the Xbox One, what reason do I have to choose one over the other?

HZD and Aloy, herself, are crucial to PlayStation and Sony's continued success. While general console exclusives like Uncharted 4 are a boon for business, new IPs like HZD are doubly valuable. By publishing this game, Sony is

> investing in an identity for the PS4. They are helping to create something that is inextricably connected to PlayStation's fourth generation, a reason for gamers to choose their console. This even holds true for publishers and developers. Rocksteady, the developer of the Batman: Arkham series – while renowned for their impressive track record - will never jump immediately to mind at the sight of the Caped Crusader. CD Projekt Red, developer of The Witcher series has the right idea. After the massive success of their third installation, the Polish studio is turning to an entirely new IP with Cyberpunk 2077 in

hopes of sealing their legacy with an IP that is unmistakably CDPR.

Mainstays like GTA, COD, and all the sports titles under the sun are not going anywhere. However, outside these juggernauts is where console producers, publishers, and developers should be looking to make their names with original IPs that cement their brand identities and provide a continuous cycle of new content for video game consumers. Whether they be console exclusives or just a break from an overly published series, new IPs in video games are inherently beneficial to all areas of the gaming industry. Of course, this all assumes they aren't garbage. *cough*No Man's Sky*cough*

The wacky world of wrestling has been long dominated by one force: World Wrestling Entertainment. Every Monday and Tuesday night, their television programs broadcast on the USA Network. Every few Sundays, their payper-view events air. For every second in between, there's the WWE Network, a streaming service chock full of all the pro wrestling you could imagine. Pro wrestling in America, especially on our airwaves, is damn near a monopoly. Fortunately, on March 15 a new avenue

opened up. On that day, Netflix brought aboard *Lucha Underground*. While it still airs live on Robert Rodriguez's El Rey Network, the show's first two seasons have found a residence on the streaming juggernaut.

What is Lucha Underground? The easy answer: pro wrestling. No matter which way you slice it, the show is focused on presenting professional wrestling matches. The long answer is a bit more interesting. For the bulk of its existence, traditional American pro wrestling broadcasts have been consistent of wrestling

matches loosely (or not at all) strung together with interview segments and backstage vignettes. LU takes a very different approach. The series is filmed as a narrative with an unmistakable B-Movie crime/horror/sci-fi vibe. Every episode is part of a larger story. Each match contributes not only to the night's events, but to an overarching tale that includes a diverse roster of characters consistently crossing paths. The backstage vignettes featured throughout are filmed with a cinematic flair and add much to the distinctive style of the show.

While this all aids in making LU unique, the singular separating factor remains lucha libre. The cast consists of luchadores from the United States, Mexico, Canada, Japan, Australia, and Puerto Rico. Many luchadores are masked, some are not – but all per-

form as unique and entertaining characters ranging from motorcycle goons to spiritual embodiments of mythical beasts to immortal vessels of death itself. Many legendary luchadores like Rey Mysterio Jr., Chavo Guerrero, Blue Demon Jr., Dr. Wagner Jr., and Mascarita Sagrada have made appearances and even stuck around for a season or two. The style of combat is high-flying, high-risk action that challenges traditional American wrestling conventions. The multitude of combatants contribute a range of backgrounds, keeping

the in-ring proceedings always exciting and never stale. Lucha libre is extravagance, from the costuming to the announcing to the fans at ringside. LU embodies those traditions excellently and adds its own unmistakable twist to maintain its individuality.

Why should you watch *Lucha Underground*? If the idea of pro wrestling throws you into a twisted rage, this show will do nothing to change that. Like mentioned above, no matter how you slice it, LU is still wrestling. If you used to watch WWE when you were in grade school, then you should give this a try. Familiar faces and favorite tropes make this easy to get in to as a casual fan, while the narrative form fits perfectly for weekend binging. If you actively enjoy wrestling, but have been repulsed by the major wrestling promotions, then you should absolutely add

this to your list. LU prides itself on show-casing the best and most promising talents from across the globe and takes a more self-aware approach to presenting wrestling that is considerably more comfortable to watch. If you are entirely new to the world of wrestling, then I could not recommend any program more than *Lucha Underground*. I would only caution new fans that the show might spoil you and make watching other programs like WWE pretty difficult.

What should you know about the

world of Lucha Underground if you want to watch? Well, interested parties, you've made it this far. If you are actually interested in watching LU on Netflix, there are a few pieces of information you should know going in. The show is set in a single arena: the Temple in Boyle Heights, CA. As introduced in the first episode, the show is run by promoter Dario Cueto. Cueto is played by Spanish actor Luis Fernandez-Gil. Fernandez-Gil has had no prior wrestling experience, but assumes the role with exceptional talent. He has been recognized in 2015 and 2016 by the Wrestling Observer

Newsletter as Non-Wrestler of the Year. The show progresses linearly, with all information necessary for viewing available at the start. I could recommend several matches, but there is no need to start anywhere but the first episode. Additionally, you'll want to stick with it for a bit. The first few episodes act as a pilot and you'll have to wait an episode or two before the show really picks up steam. You might also want to get those subtitles up on screen. As many of the performers are native Spanish speakers, their promos are in Spanish; Netflix subtitles are in English and will translate the promos for you. Most importantly, prepare to have fun. If I haven't conveyed this clearly yet, LU is entertainment. This is over-the-top, ridiculous amusement and if you are willing to suspend your disbelief, you are going to have a great time.



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
Drake More Life By Emma Chioke

Drake and the great music he gives us. More Life to him.






Taylor Bennett Restoration of an American Idol By Josh Rosen

TinderGodz The Emergence EP By Reyna Wang

Up and coming jazz fusion band TinderGodz marks their formation as the night they played a basement show in Belmont last fall. No one at the show had ever heard of the band, but the crowd was immediately captivated by their distinctively complex yet danceable groove and their playful energy. The five-piece from The New School. who chose their band name on a whim in reference to the bassist's avid use of Tinder at the time, kicked off their set with a prayer service to the "Tinder gods," comically slid snippets of traditional jazz into their avant-garde compositions, and tried to hype up the audience by moshing and kicking over stands. But don't be fooled by their foolishness; TinderGodz's music demonstrates tastefully innovative manipulation of unusual time signatures and melodies, and their performances are

reminds me a lot of Chance the Rap- characterized by skillful and expressive musicianship.

> This year, TinderGodz released The Emergence EP, aptly named. The band is inspired by experimental jazz musicians like Tigran Hamasyan, Steve Coleman, and Donny McCaslin as well as by metal bands like Meshuggah, and they describe the unique style of their EP as metal on the bottom with jazz harmony and improvisations on top. The bottom is comprised of weighty, metal-inspired bass lines, guitar fuzz, and dense drums, which include rich fills and are saturated with characteristic elements of metal drumming like double kicks and liberal use of cymbals. Still, this "metal" bottom diverges from the metal genre as it meanders through different time signatures and explores complex rhythms. All of the drums on the EP are programmed, as it wasn't possible to record them live at the time, which is on one hand impressive from a production standpoint, but on the other unfortunate as the percussion, especially the cymbals, is flat and a bit quiet in the mix, detracting from the full-bodied, heavy groove that TinderGodz brings to their live performances.

> "This Is What Happens," opens the EP explosively with weighty drums and fast and a dark sounding bass and guitar riff after a brief initial saxophone solo and a muted shout. The saxophone first builds on this riff when it reenters, but then breaks away from it into a more freeform melody, loosening the composition from its rapid and rigid start and contibuting to the "improvised top" of TinderGodz's sound. The keys, whose rhymically contrasting chords produce interesting dissonance, are also essential to the "jazz harmony" that characterizes the "top," albeit less dominantly than the sax. Shifting between repeated phrases and improvised segments and guiding each song in new directions, the sax can be seen as taking the place of the fronting vocalist of the band, and though it provides engaging melodies, I would have liked to hear more diversity in the instruments that drive the compositions. Additionally, improvisation is an important element of jazz, and along with intriguing shifts in harmony and time, the freeness of movement gives the EP a dreamlike quality; however, I think TinderGodz's songs could be improved by catchier melodies or even a real vocalist, increasing the

potential for emotional attachment, which is lacking. Another drawback to The Emergence EP is that since each instrument was recorded individually, the EP lacks the personality and flow that surface in their live performances, as the members of the band respond to one another's improvisations. Though, to address some of these these drawbacks, the TinderGodz did mention

that going forward, they hope to expand the size of their band, adding vocals as well as an extra guitar and more horn parts, and to release a higher quality, live-recorded album.

However, the playful attitude that characterizes TinderGodz's live performances certainly

comes through on the EP. "French Scream" begins with the bassist answering a ringing phone and repeatedly asking, "Hello, is this Baguette?" presumably in reference to their French sax player, culminating in a maniacal scream before the distorted guitar and heavy bass riff take over at full force. The third song is actually a cover of Sandstorm by Darude, a song that the band's guitarist is inexplicably obsessed with. Though the cover is made in the style of "recorder-core" and is obviously intended to be comical, I would say it's just as strong as any of the other tracks on the EP. Who knew how much better Sandstorm could sound with some gritty bass, blast beats, and half-decently played recorder?

Though they've only released about 20 minutes of material, TinderGodz shows that it has a lot of potential to appeal to a wide variety of listeners, which ironically results from their oneof-a-kind, niche jazz-metal sound. Jazz Boys will dig it the EP for its free jazz qualities, metalheads and fans of harder hitting music like myself will dig it because it's "heavy, (dude)" and everyone can dig it at the function because it gets them moving. TinderGodz's music is rhythmically and melodically complex while remaining comprehensible to the casual listener, and achieving this balance is no easy feat.



Spoon Hot Thoughts By John Looby

Spoon's Hot Thoughts was arguably one of the best records I bought and it would have been the best if I hadn't bought reissues of my favorite albums. The album continues the long trend of constant innovation while still coming from the same vein that brought us

Miles Okazaki **Trickster** By Kieran McAuliffe

Miles Okazaki's latest release Trickster shows the continued development of his unique rhythmically elusive jazz guitar style. He recorded the album while on tour with his mentor Steve Coleman, to which comparisons are inevitable, though Miles definitely proves himself as an independent artist with a unique voice.

As the name of the record suggests, Trickster is not about spoon-feeding singable melodies to the listener. Miles instead presents puzzles: snaky rhythmic phrases that reveal their simple interior only to the careful listener.

The album features a cast not unfamiliar to fans of Okazaki and the scene around him. He borrows electric bassist Anthony Tidd and drummer Sean Rickmann from Coleman's band to help strongly outline the thorny rhythmic forms of these compositions. Pianist Craig Taborn acts as a great counterpart to Miles, as the two trade off both rhythmic chords and melodic phrases especially on tracks like "Box in a Box" and "Kudzu", and also taking the lead role on "Eating Earth".

Reflecting the cover art featuring origami animals crafted from simple paper base, an understated acoustic texture permeates the whole record. Unlike his contemporaries that use guitar tones colored by electronics, Okazaki sticks to either a hollow body guitar plugged straight into an amp or a ny-Ion string acoustic. All members of the ensemble play with great instrumental patience, never overstriking notes and never saturating the tonal field with aimless shredding. The result is none of the daunting cascades of noise one expects from an album that falls within

the realm of "experimental jazz".

Unlike on his previous works, Miles brings in a funk element on tracks such as "Mischief Maker", "Box in a Box" and "Caduceus" reminiscent of Coleman's works. Also, on the last track "Borderland" features Miles exposed playing solo on an acoustic guitar, demonstrating that complex rhythms can be not only be handled by a guitarist alone, but also that they can be lyrical. Along from giving the audience a knot to untie, *Trickster* asks many questions of where experimental jazz on the guitar can go.
