

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Breaking News: Paul Manafort Lied! Again!

Paul Manafort, ex-Trump campaign chairman and current convicted felon, has recently been accused of meeting with Wikileaks leader, Julian Assange in March of 2016. *The Guardian* claims the two met in the Ecuadorian embassy in London, and though there is no information in regards to what they talked about, the timing of this alleged meeting occurred months before a major leak by Assange's team.

In July of 2016, Wikileaks published a series of emails from upper level Democratic National Committee staff members. Some of the most important information revealed by this leak was the DNC's attempts to undermine the Bernie Sanders presidential campaign. One of the ideas thrown around by a DNC staffer involved getting someone to ask if Sanders was an atheist in an attempt to discredit his religious background. The leaks also revealed how former head of the DNC, Debbie Wasserman Schultz, had emailed MSNBC to get them to apologize for claiming that she did not support the Sanders campaign. More generally, the leaks gave insight to the methods that the DNC used to raise exorbitant amounts of money from financial donors; things like getting seats close to President Obama were often prerequisites for getting donations.

The grim reality that these emails revealed damaged faith in the Democratic party on both sides: Sanders supporters felt betrayed and no longer believed that the DNC and Hillary Clinton were honest, and Republicans felt that their beliefs about the DNC were confirmed. Clearly, these leaks were highly beneficial to the Trump campaign. However, they

are call to question whether Russia's interference in the 2016 elections on Trump's behalf were co-orchestrated by the Trump Campaign. The "Steele Dossier" (the results of a private investigation conducted by Christopher Steele, British Intelligence's former head of the Russian desk) indicate that

pay for previously leaking secret US documents pertaining to the Iraq war. At the very least, there is a chance that he might get a reduced sentence. Vox points out that Assange and Wikileaks have always taken a very "anti-US" stance, arguing that the US acts as an imperial power that interferes heavily



Russia's efforts to sow dissent among the American public was encouraged by the Trump campaign. It also points to Manafort as being a major player in these alleged dealings.

Paul Manafort is considered by the dossier to be the middleman between Trump and the Kremlin. Within this context it seems likely that Manafort would be the one to organize the Wikileaks for Trump's benefit. This covert meeting between Assange and Manafort would have not only been a first step towards sabotaging the DNC, but it would have benefitted Assange as well. *The Guardian* points out that with a Trump presidency aided by Wikileaks, there is a chance that Assange would no longer be sought out by the US government to

in other countries' affairs. Assange has held that Hillary Clinton is someone who has no problem with using the US military abroad, making her more dangerous than Trump. However, it is important to note that the hacker who gave the information to Wikileaks to release, Guccifer 2.0 is most likely a Russian agent (he once forgot to hide his IP address, which indicated that he was a Russian GRU agent). While both Russia and Assange deny any collaboration, it is more than likely that the two took advantage of each other's common interests to damage the DNC. Assange similarly denounces the Guardian's article about his alleged meeting with Manafort, and is planning on suing the publication.

Unlike Assange, Manafort was unable

to call for asylum at an embassy before getting indicted for conspiracy against the United States, laundering money, acting as an unregistered agent for a foreign principle (Manafort lobbied for pro-Russian-Ukrainian Party), and for making false statements, among other charges. It's important to note, however, that "conspiracy against the United States" indicates that Manafort planned to commit a crime against the United States, in this case massive money laundering. But this doesn't mean there is no evidence that Manafort enabled collusion; during Trump's campaign, Manafort had met with Russian lobbyists who promised to get information on Hillary Clinton. Manafort had entered a plea deal with Special counsel Robert Muller in September after pleading guilty to one charge of conspiracy. It was understood that Manafort would assist Muller in his investigation in order to avoid further money laundering trials. Currently, however, Muller is considering hitting Manafort with even more charges, as his group believe that Manafort has consistently been lying to them throughout the investigation. Investigators say that more details on December 7.

Considering Manafort's criminal history and international connections, on the surface it seems very likely that he and Assange did meet to discuss collusion. However, there is some worry amongst other news sources that this story might be a plant to further discredit the media. Politico has hypothesized that if some of the Guardian's sources lied to them, it could prep the public to distrust news sources critical of Trump more and more.

E. Gads: E. Coli outbreak strikes in U.S. and Canada


Despite its barbaric rather origins, most people would agree that Thanksgiving is about family, celebration. and togetherness. However, no matter how kind we may be, there's always company that we'd rather avoid than extend a hand to. This vear, families were forced to deal with a particularly unwelcome guest at their Thanksgiving tables--an outbreak of the newest strand of E. coli.

For those of you lucky enough to be unacquainted with E. coli, here's a quick biology lesson. E. coli (short for Escherichia coli) is a kind of bacteria. While most strains are harmless to and even necessary for the human body, others, if contracted, can make you sick. Injurious e. coli bacteria produce a toxin known as Shiga toxin, which damage the lining of the small intestine and trigger the symptoms generally associated with E. coli illness. As E. coli bacteria commonly resides in the intestines, its pathogenic strains will usually cause stomach cramps, diarrhea, and vomiting. Fevers are frequent symptoms of E. coli, though they generally don't break 101o F/38.5o C according to the Center of Disease Control and Prevention. Fortunately, most people get better within 5 to 7 days of contracting pathogenic E. coli, though around 5-10% of cases result in hemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS), which in turn can cause kidney failure and even death. There have been a number of E. coli outbreaks in the past, most notably in early 2016, when a number of people became sick after eating at Chipotle restaurants.

The most recent E. coli epidemic began in October. Though the U.S. Food & Drug Administration claims its earliest case was reported on Halloween, the

It was just in time for Thanksgiving!

CDC states that cases were first reported salads and sandwiches; iceberg stomach cramping and diarrhea isn't the far earlier, on October 8. Two days before Thanksgiving, both the CDC and the FDA launched an investigation of the outbreak. As of November 29, cases of E. coli have been reported in 12 US states and certain areas of Canada. There have been no deaths so far, though 16 people have been hospitalized, including one person who developed HUS.



According to a survey conducted of those infected, romaine lettuce seems to be the primary culprit of this year's outbreak. On November 26, the CDC issued a Food Safety Alert advising people not to consume or sell romaine lettuce for the time being, specifically lettuce grown in northern and central California. The outbreak has not resulted in any recalls, with the FDA claiming that it does not have enough information on the outbreak's origins to request a targeted recall. Nevertheless, on November 20, a number of produce companies agreed not to sell or serve romaine lettuce to their customers in the wake of the outbreak. In the meantime, customers have been turning to other leafy greens for their

lettuce is being treated as a viable best of ways to finish our fall semesters. alternative, with prices soaring In addition to romaine lettuce, the CDC also advises people to avoid raw/ uncooked meats, unpasteurized dairy products and juices, and to thoroughly wash all fruits and vegetables. Good hygiene is also a must--wash your hands thoroughly after using the bathroom, before and after preparing foods, and after being in contact with animals and their environments. Those with weaker immune systems and/or diabetes should also be wary, as they are at a higher risk of contracting E. coli infections.

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Melania Trump's White House Christmas Spectacular

On Monday November 26, 2018, First Lady Melania Trump revealed the 2018 White House Christmas decorations to the public. The mansion's decorations include 20.000 feet of lights, 14.000 ornaments, 12,000 bows, Christmas trees, pencil wreaths to promote the "Be Best" campaign, a gigantic gingerbread replica of the National Mall, and most notably, 40 bright red Topiary trees. The display was set up entirely by volunteers, most of whom are either veterans or are representative of veteran families; out of about 6,000 applicants, only a little over two hundred people were selected to be a part of the decorating team.

The theme for this year's White House Christmas is "American Treasures;" in a statement, Melania Trump said the decorations are meant to "honor the heart and spirit of the American people." The display was seemingly very thought out by Mrs. Trump; however, as soon as the holiday décor made its debut online, the criticisms

started to flood in, mostly surrounding the topiaries. The tall red trees were compared to the handmaids' outfits in the television series The Handmaid's Tale, the hallway of blood from Stanley Kubrick's The Shining, and soon the phrase "blood-red" began to be used to describe the festive decorations.

While many poked fun at the White House Christmas just for laughs, some commentators took a different route, insinuating that the Topiaries represented the oppression and bloodshed that took place on American soil, while others believed they tipped a hat to mother Russia. The backlash of the White House Christmas decorations, whether or not a comment was made with the intent of entertainment, was labeled as liberal hysteria by those who saw it as an attack against the Trump administration.

The first lady did not take long to react to the critiques. Two days after the reveal, during a TIME interview, she stated that everyone has their own particular taste, but she believes that the setup looks "fantastic," and welcomes everyone to "the people's house" to view them in real life. The following Friday, on November 30, Mrs. Trump gave a tour of the White House Christmas, an experience that was much more personal and insightful of her ideas than the original video posted by the White House. She made sure to address her decision to incorporate the color red so diligently throughout. Not only did she want it to represent the celebration of Christmas and the American flag, but also "bravery, heart, and patriotism."

Volunteers who worked on the presentation also responded to the insults. One florist in particular, Vickie Wenstrup said she was proud of the finished product and thought the negative comments were "horrible."

The whole series of events has allowed for people to catch sight of a more authentic side of Melania Trump that is rarely seen. While the original White House Christmas revelation was

a very manufactured representation of the White House and first lady, with generic Christmas music and footage of a lone first lady walking down extravagantly decorated halls, the backlash of her choice of decorations allowed her to give a personal response. Unlike President Trump, the first lady rarely responds publically to criticism and usually has her communications director make statements on her behalf. While the subject matter is not all that significant in the grand scope of American politics, although it has been treated as a national debate, the incident resulted in a very interesting outcome that allowed the nation to see more of the rather reclusive first lady. Hopefully the public will hear more from Melania Trump in future.

The Weight of a Kilogram is Changing Thought you knew about kilograms? You thought wrong

TThe central issue of this article is simply put the intersection of philosophy and complex scientific principles. For those of you who aren't STEM majors the kilogram was first defined in 1729 as the mass or a platinum-iridium rod. There are several of these rods around the world in places such as Washington D.C. and Paris. Companies tend to use these rods in order to maintain consistency in weight measurements. 2020 Democratic Pres. Candidates, explained

The Democratic presidential primaries are more than a year away, but here's an early look at many of the possible candidates. Special thanks to Wikipedia for a comprehensive list of 42 (!!!) possible candidates.

- 1. Joe Biden served as Barack Obama's vice president for eight years and was a longtime Senator from Delaware before that. He currently holds a significant lead in early polling, at nearly 30% in most, but this could largely be because of name recognition. "Uncle Joe" a beloved figure by many, but his handling of the Anita Hill hearings and his role in passing the 1994 Crime Bill will come under scrutiny if he decides to run.
- 2. Bernie Sanders, a democratic socialist Senator from Vermont came in second during the last presidential primary. His surprise success and subsequent advocacy has pushed the Democratic Party to the left on a plethora of positions. However, while he is currently second in polling to Biden, he is currently only polling in the mid-teens, less than half of his 2016 vote percentage, which could portend weakness for him as a 2020 candidate. - 3. Beto O'Rourke, an outgoing Congressman from Texas who almost beat Ted Cruz in this year's senate contest, has become a beloved figure among young people and activists. He wasn't included in polling until recently, but so far he polls better than most. And, ya know, Abraham Lincoln also lost a senate race two years before becoming president.
- 4. Kamala Harris is a freshman senator from California, but she has already made a name for herself as an outspoken critic of the Trump administration, especially during the family separation crisis and the Kavanaugh hearings. She does relatively well in polling, but she does not have the same name recognition as some of her competitors. Some progressives also really don't like her, for reasons not really explainable.
- 5. Elizabeth Warren is a former Harvard professor who helped start

the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau and is currently a Senator from Massachusetts. Along with Sanders, she is a favorite among progressives and has recently publicized several important policy proposals. However, she was recently criticized by the

Cherokee Nation for using a DNA test to "prove" Native American ancestry.

- Kirsten Gillibrand is a second term Senator from New York, who has voted against Trump more than any of her colleagues, a dramatic evolution from being a relatively-conservative upstate congresswoman. During her senate tenure, she has been the most prominent advocate for victims of sexual violence, even before the #MeToo movement came to prominence. She was the first senator to call on former Sen. Al Franken to resign for groping multiple women, but this has surprisingly caused many wealthy donors to turn against her to forcing a popular colleague from office.
- 7. Cory Booker is a Senator from New Jersey and former Mayor of Newark. He is popular for his social media presence and various viral headlines, including the time he saved a woman from a house fire. However, he has long been associated with the financial services industry, which may not be popular among Democratic primary voters.
- 8. Amy Klobuchar is a Senator from Minnesota, where she is

extremely popular. She won reelection for a third term by 34% in 2018, in a state that Clinton only won by 1.5%. She's super popular among people that know her, but the problem is that not many people know who she is.

9. Deval Patrick is the former Massachusetts governor is a relatively-unknown candidate who's been out

of public office for over four years. Despite his lack of name recognition, he's close friends with former President Obama and many of his former staffers are encouraging him to run.

10. Sherrod Brown is a longtime senator from Ohio. The media began speculating about his potential candidacy after the midterms, when he was the only Democrat

to win statewide in Ohio. He's a progressive who focuses on economic issues. He'd be the ideal candidate for Democrats to try to win back white working-class voters than abandoned the party for Trump in 2016. Peace & Justice is a Hidden Gem at Fordham

Almost forty years ago, a Fordham professor was arrested for breaking into a nuclear weapons plant. Daniel Berrigan, S.J. was already famous for his demonstration burning draft records with homemade napalm, and even in memory he remains one of Fordham's most famed educators. eulogized in the New York Times and elsewhere around the world.

Father Berrigan was ardently opposed to the war in Vietnam - in his words, "our apologies, good friends, for the fracture of good order, the burning of paper instead of children... We could not, so help us God, do otherwise." While he has passed on, parts of Fordham still retain his deep commitment to faith in action. In the words of Peace and Justice program director Dr. van Buren, "Peace and Justice Studies might seem similar to other interdisciplinary programs at Fordham - but what makes it unique is its focus on issues of justice."

Peace and Justice Studies may not be the most well-known program at Fordham, but throughout my four vears here I've found its faculty to be some of the most dedicated and diverse voices on campus. Some of my professors are retired military, and some are ardent pacifists. Some have devoted their lives to New York City, and some hail from half a world away. They tend to teach not just from a textbook, but from their own experience. Professor Asha Castleberry knows how important it is to have female UN peacekeepers because she was one. Dr. Erick Rengifo's lectures on climate change aren't just graphs or charts, but a heartfelt account of mountain snow melting around his hometown in

For Dr. van Buren and past directors, the program draws its inspiration directly from the Catholic social justice and peace activism movement. More than almost any other department at Fordham, its students are required to perform service work, both for local charities and international NGO's. Every lecture and every semester is designed to prepare you for the type of work that will give you more than just enough money to live. Freshman

year I took a class on land rights in the Amazon, and this past fall, that class was the first thing on my mind when I interviewed indigenous activists from the Amazon at a UN climate summit. I think about Professor Castleberry's class every time I see a story on the news about UN peacekeepers. While other classes ask me what I want to do with my life, the Peace and Justice

Fordham likes to talk about faith and mission, and for many of us the occasional sticker or "Let's Get JesuLit" t-shirt is enough to demonstrate our devotion. But in the teaching of Father Berrigan, faith isn't about where your head is at, or even where your heart is at. Faith is about where you are. And you don't necessarily have to handcuff yourself to anything to be an activist. If vou want to work on Wall Street, consider



program asks me who I want to be. It challenges me to ask if I can do more for the causes I claim to care about, in a time when many of us should be asking ourselves the same question.

Most professors in the program carry their work far beyond the classroom. Dr. Rengifo helped found Spes Nova, an innovative fair trade initiative that helps lift impoverished communities around the world out of poverty, in addition to his work as a consultant. This past week, two undercover police units clashed in Detroit. One unit was acting as drug dealers while the other was pretending to be buyers-- do you know where I am going with this? 



It's that time of year again – chestnuts are roasting on an open fire, Megyn Kelly is being roasted on Twitter, and Black Santa ornaments are once again gracing store shelves in our corner of the North Bronx.

What's so magical about Black Santa? Believe it or not, he's actually more historically accurate than most of our modern Christmas celebrations. How did Saint Nicholas go from decking another priest to decking the halls? In parts of Europe, the feast day of St. Nicholas and Christmas are still separate holidays, but in America Christmas is mostly an amorphous glob of actual Christianity, paganism, random 19th-century poetry and,

of course, unrestrained capitalism.

Like historical Black Santa, Santa in America has a rich history supporting those on society's margins. Long before political correctness Starbucks and cups became buzzwords, whitewashing of Santa Claus

was a flashpoint during the civil rights movement of the 1960's. In the words of one Southern Christian Leadership Conference minister, "if a department store cannot conceive of a black man as Santa Claus for 30 days, it most assuredly cannot conceive of his being president or vice president for 365 days." For decades. Jet magazine ran covers with various black celebrities dressed as Santa, and the not-Cosby covers are charming time capsules to a world where black mall Santas were employed in Macy's flagship store and elsewhere across the country. (Today, Macy's still has a hidden black Santa with an elf bouncer, in the strangest possible interpretation of "secret Santa.") Black Santa has always existed for those who know where to look, in short, but it's also possible to go your whole life hardly ever seeing him.

When I was younger, almost every portrait I saw of Santa Claus was white. (Granted, I've lived a large portion of my life in the rural South.) Santa being black was at most a joke, like when Kenan Thompson dressed up as Santa on Saturday Night Live, and the idea of Santa as a man from the Middle East was almost unimaginable. (Insert your own joke about TSA strip searching Santa Claus here.) As Aisha Harris wrote in Slate a couple years back, there's a tendency in America sometimes to see white as the default. Santa is one of our few cultural symbols that just radiates innocence and gentleness - what does it say about us that it seems so impossible to see a Black or Middle Eastern man that way?

In a country that's currently using tear gas on refugee children, maybe we need a bit more of the Santa who spent his fortune helping travelers than we do of the Santa who's hauled out once a year to sell used cars. Someday, maybe we'll celebrate the Santa who welcomes the stranger instead of turning them away - a community organizer, not just another Christmas ornament. And I can only hope that, someday, Netflix will make the Christmas movie starring Idris Elba we all deserve.

It's Time to Wake Up to Wake Child

How often do you listen to your Discover Weekly playlist on Spotify? If you're like me, not often at all. Why discover new music when you can listen to your favorite album from 11th grade on loop for three weeks straight? A few weeks ago, however, I took a chance and decided to check out what Spotify's shadowy algorithm thought I would like. Now, I don't make a lot of good decisions; in fact, I make a troublingly low number of them for someone who is allowed to vote and decide on the future of this country. But listening to my Spotify Discover playlist, however, was one of these rare and excellent life choices, because it introduced me to the as-of-yet littleknown about band Wake Child.

Created by three students at Berklee College of Music in Boston, Wake Child is an indie band that fuses alternative rock with psychedelic sounds and jazzy rhythms. The band's members--Danny Max--hail from California, Georgia, and Tennessee, respectively. Their musical backgrounds are just as diverse--Silberstein, a singersongwriter, has a solo EP out from before he founded Wake Child, entitled "Static Noise and Other Miscellaneous Sounds"; Max, a guitarist, is reportedly more of an improviser when it comes to his music; and Hines, a former gospel drummer, draws much of his inspiration from the psychedelic jazz and modern trap genres. The band considers its sound as "[a synthetization of] the hometowns Georgia California, Tennessee into a melting pot of Psych/R&B brilliance [with] bluesy

guitars and effortless harmonies." This wide assortment in backgrounds and musical education definitely shows in the various, eclectic elements of their songs that they somehow manage to piece together flawlessly.

The first song I heard from them-the song that appeared on my Discover Weekly playlist -- was their third single, "Kathaleen." It was released over a year ago, in early November 2017, and I was surprised that I hadn't heard

it sooner (then again, my listening to "Friday I'm in Love" by The Cure at least three times a day, whether it is actually Friday or not, does get in the way of going out and looking for new music to listen to). I don't think I'm exaggerating when I say the song isn't like anything I've ever listened to before. It combines captivating lyrics with a killer baseline, hard-hitting percussion, and a hypnotizing and ambient melody played on an electric guitar and a synth (at least, I think it's an electric guitar and a synth; on the off-chance that Wake Child is reading this, please bear in mind that I don't study music and haven't taken lessons on the subject since high school). Wake Child's website states that they recorded "Kathaleen" at an old cabin in the Catskills, which definitely fits in with the haunting yet mellow and

"Don't Fall in Love." Unfortunately, as they are a student band and are still in school, they can't dedicate all of their time to recording new songs and releasing them accordingly. Looking at their timeline, it seems that their release schedule is rather spaced out. "In the End", "Hangup Blues", and "Kathaleen" were all released at various points throughout 2017, while "Don't Fall In Love", their latest single, came out in April of this year.

All things considered, though, all four songs are absolute bangers in their own, different way. "In the End" has a much fuller and heavier sound than "Kathaleen", while "Hangup Blues" has a much more bluesy feel to it than either of those songs. "Don't Fall in Love", for its part, is jazz meets progressive rock--kind of like what I imagine a collaboration between Kurt

> gotten a chance to meet. All four songs have similar, yet very different, feels to them, from their lyrics to the instruments used to the overall ambience that they create. It's a rather remarkable feat, to release four songs with four different auras in the span of a year and a half, and it makes it all the more stunning to me that none of the band's singles on Spotify have broken a

> So, if you've got a break between listening to Britney Spears for the 80th time of the day and Ariana Grande for the 120th, Wake Child is absolutely worth your time to check out. They're also very

receptive to feedback--my boyfriend and I reached out to them via email to ask if they were planning on releasing anything new soon, and they responded within a matter of hours. And though they've only got four singles out for now, they've apparently got a fifth in the works, set for release in early 2019. As for me, I'll be replaying "Kathaleen" in lieu of The Cure while I wait.

Earl Sweatshirt, an Illinoisan raised in California, has returned with his new album Some Rap Songs, and in fact his album is some rap songs. It has been a little over three years since he released his previous album, *IDLSIDGO*, in 2015. Some Rap Songs has been delayed many times. 
Here's an in depth listen to Earl Sweatshirt's new album

The album requires a few listens before it grows on the listener. At first the album seems underwhelming. 



TIK TOK (by Ke\$ha?)



Dummy Boy 6ix9ine **Jack Archambault**



Tekashi 6ix9ine's sophomore album DUMMY BOY is bad, but that's probably the least of his worries right now. The rapper, who currently faces life in prison on racketeering charges, fails to rap with the type of unabashed vitriol that was present on his first album, Day69: Graduation Day. Instead, he opts for quieter tracks that are heavy on features in what I can only assume are attempts at capitalizing on his sudden fame and becoming a mainstream success.

Take "FEFE", a collaboration with Nicki Minaj and actually one of the better songs on the album. 6ix9ine and Minaj take turns rapping over a soft beat in a marked change of pace from 6ix9ine's usual aggressive, punchy style. Released as a single over the summer, "FEFE" climbed to number three on the Billboard Hot 100. Unfortunately, most of the songs on DUMMY BOY feel like cheap attempts to replicate its success.

On a couple of occasions, 6ix9ine goes back to what made him popular

in the first place: rapping with such unrestrained venom that listeners have no choice but to get hyped. Songs from his first album like "BILLY" and "KEKE" actually probably definitely go too hard, but that is what makes 6ix9ine 6ix9ine. When I listen to him, I expect to feel like I have fire coursing through my veins and like I can eat a bucketful of glass shards. On DUMMY BOY, he achieves this in small doses with "TATI" and "KIKA", but all too often he is either overshadowed by the artists he features or spits incoherent nonsense. For example, the last 45 seconds of "WONDO" feature TrifeDrew yelling, "DVDs, porno tapes." Nonstop. On a two-minute song. That means that 37.5% of the song is devoted to shouting about DVDs and porn, which is not exactly a great look for a guy who was found guilty of using a child in a sexual performance in 2015. In an interview with Angie Martinez about "FEFE", 6ix9ine said, "I didn't put no effort into that shit." With DUMMY BOY being as bad as it is and his life going up in flames, it might not be a bad idea for 6ix9ine to change his tack and start trying just a little.

So, full disclosure, I was never a fan of X, his passing didn't really change that, and the heinous abuse allegations had something to do with it. It's hard for me to hear him say "I gave her everything" on a track, and not immediately think he's being dishonest and immature. That said, I also don't want to spend my 250 words congratulating myself for frowning on a dead person so I'll try to focus on the music.

Posthumously released. supposedly finished while he was still alive, "BAD!" is a good example of a characteristic XXXTentacion track. It's got an infectious hook, druggy, depressive atmosphere, and it's incredibly short, two choruses, one verse. X's strengths are in the hooks and his line delivery, which in this instance are taken to a whiny pitch that might sound better coming from Trippie Redd, not his best.

It doesn't help that "BAD!" is another song where X seems to be complaining about a woman. X's lyrics are pretty simple, but he emphasizes rudimentary wordplay to make his observations sound cleverer than they are. For example, on this track the woman is "bad" and "profane" like a "bad word." What that's actually supposed to convey about this woman, and how X feels about her, I don't know. Perhaps, like cursing, she's alluring because she's somehow forbidden? The verse is only four lines so he didn't really give himself the space to elaborate. On the whole, the track is just pointlessly bitter. X made good on his promise to spread bad vibes, and I don't have any use for them right now.





In the words of Jerry Seinfeld as Barry B Benson in the hit cinematic masterpiece, Bee Movie, "do ya like jazz?" And to answer my own question, I do now. Jeff Goldblum's jazz album The Capitol Studio Sessions is an absolute delight. I've never really listened to jazz of my own volition, but I have to say I really enjoyed listening to this album. The melodies were smooth and calming, making the listening experience feel like I was a woman of the highest class. This is the sort of album you play while taking a bath, glass of wine in hand, candles glowing around you in your \$1.6 million home. 

DiCaprio 2 by upcoming Atlanta rapper J.I.D is a strong follow-up to his last full length project *The Never Story* that mixes the hard hitting trap instrumentals of his Atlanta contemporaries with a hyper literate, impeccable flow. I cannot undersell how good J.I.D is at riding an instrumental. His lackadaisical, almost nasally flow allows him to weave in and out of a track effortlessly. Despite originating in Atlanta, it is clear that J.I.D's most direct influences include the other lyrical savants of our generation such as Kendrick, Vince Staples, and his cosigner J.Cole. Cole is also featured on the record Off Deez in which the duo spits lightning fast bars over a quirky, jackrabbit instrumental.

While the subject matter of J.I.D's lyricism is oftentimes par for the course as it pertains to "lyrical rappers", the artist truly shines through his fusion of old school, boom-bapesque production and more modern club bangers. While subject to change, I would certainly say that my current favorite on the album is Westbrook, featuring A\$AP Ferg. After getting into extreme metal for a while, Cattle Decapitation has quickly become one of my favorite bands. This vegetarian (yes, I know it's great) goregrind/death metal outfit has released a compilation of unreleased tracks from their vaults. It contains a massive 23 songs, but only clocks in at 34 minutes. Most of the songs on the album are shorter than a minute. In fact one track, "The Recapitation of Cattle", is only 4 seconds long. It's a really cool thing to listen to the album and see how their music has progressed since their inception, from very short songs to a longer and more sophisticated production. Each has its merits. I like hearing the angry and quick bursts of rage against the human race on songs like, "Birth. Cancer. Death." and "Chili Dispenser" along with the demos of songs that made their albums, such as "Human Jerky- Demo."

Another odd twist is that the album contains tracks all in Spanish like "Tripas de Pepe," "Vino de lo Sanguifero," and "Queso de Cabeza," which is something I've personally never heard before, but think is a really cool touch. My favorite tracks on the album are the later tracks because they showcase the stuff I love about this band: the technical prowess, the awesome quality, Travis Ryan's disgusting guttural vocals, and the weird pseudo-clean vocals that sound surprisingly amazing. It sounds a lot like a track that belongs on the album Monolith of Inhumanity, which is considered to be one of their best. A Brief Inquiry Into Online Relationships The 1975 Olivia Langenberg



The 1975 released their third album this past weekend, and somehow it manages to have an even more pretentious title than their previous I like it when you sleep, for you are so beautiful yet so unaware of it. But don't worry, they know that. A Brief Inquiry Into Online Relationships has been receiving rave reviews, with some calling it the best album of the year. While admittedly, The 1975 is my favorite band, I'm going to agree.

This is the most daring and emotional album from the band to date. It explores a different genre in almost every song, from soft acoustic in "Be My Mistake" to typical pop in "TOOTIMETOOTIMETOOTIME" to the jazz-inspired "Sincerity Is Scary." Frontman Matty Healy is the band's lyricist, and he has never been shy of talking about sex and drugs. He pushes himself in A Brief Inquiry with incredibly raw vocals, exposing his battle with heroin addiction, loneliness, and fear of the digital age. "It's Not Living (If It's Not With You)" is reminiscent of "UGH!" from their previous album, in which Healy sings a love song about heroin. "I Couldn't Be More In Love" was recorded the day before he entered rehab, and listening to it is absolutely gut-wrenching. What is particularly interesting about A Brief Inquiry is its emphasis on instrumentals rather than lyrics, which strays somewhat from The 1975's previous material. Somehow, though,

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this album still managed to hit me like a freight train, and I've been dancing and crying for days. The album is wrapped up with "I Always Wanna Die (Sometimes)" which is so powerful that I can't even write anything more about it. This album is a complete masterpiece, which excites me as a huge '75 fan because they are already working on a follow-up album *Notes On A Conditional Form*, due early next year. I cannot wait to see *A Brief Inquiry* live in January and ultimately float outside my body.
